

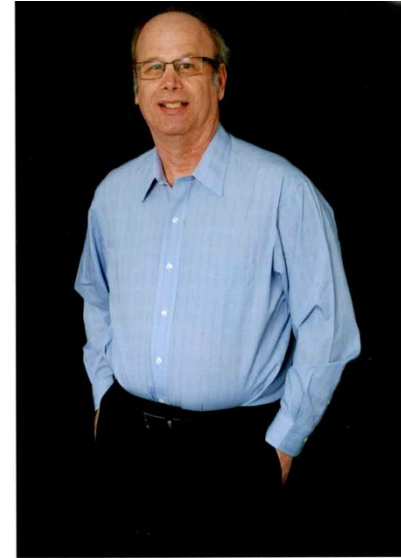
Stuart Lee Rosenberg
