LAVC Profile: Debra Erickson

"Community Services at LAVC is more than just classes - it's about family, belonging, and lifelong learning," says Debra Erickson, who leads the department with passion and purpose.

Raised in the San Fernando Valley by a family of educators, Debra always knew education would be part of her path. "I never imagined it would be in higher education," she reflects. Her journey began at the University of Utah, where she discovered the transformative power of continuing education. "It was never just a job. I loved meeting students, hearing their stories, and building connections."

"We welcome everyone, from age 5 to 95," she says. "We bring the community to campus, and the campus to the community." Her vision for the next five years includes expanding partnerships with local businesses, offering classes in restaurants, bakeries, and flower shops. One such partnership is already blooming: a floral design program led by a local entrepreneur. "One day, I hope we'll hold those classes right in her shop," Debra says. "That way, we're enriching lives and supporting small businesses."

And that, she says, is the spirit of LA Valley College. "Our colleagues support each other like family. Valley isn't just a college. It's a community where people care deeply. When you give here, you're not just supporting <u>Community Services</u>. You're investing in Valley, and in the lives, we change every day."

"A Perilous Reckoning" LAVC Art Gallery



The 2025–2026 LAVC Art Gallery season opened this September with "A Perilous Reckoning", a solo exhibition by artist <u>Gina Herrera</u>. Drawing on her Native American (Tesuque Pueblo) and Costa Rican heritage, as well as her 25 years of service in the Armed Forces, Herrera's work weaves together natural materials, branches, rocks, cocoons, and nests, with reflections on conflict, industrialization, and our planet's fragile future. <u>The show runs through October 17th and is free to the public</u>. Fall 2025 Regular Gallery hours are Mondays from 6-8 p.m., and Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays from 1-6 p.m.

Veterans Archery Workshop
